What is YAM?

YAM (short for **Yet Another Mailer**) is a MIME-compliant open-source Internet email client written for AmigaOS-based computer systems. It supports POP3, SMTP, TLSv1/SSLv3 connection security, multiple users, multiple identities, PGPv2/v5 encryption, unlimited hierarchical folders, filters, a configurable GUI (based on [?MUI](#)) and an ARexx interface and many other features which are common for Mail User Agents ([?MUA](#)) today. As the development of YAM goes back to 1995 it is probably one of the most feature-rich applications on the Amiga platform. Especially the MUI-based user interface allowed to implement functionality which are commonly used in graphical mail user client on other platforms today.
